
Wyomissing Area High School Drama Club

AP Computer Science Courses Receive College Board Recognition

Wyomissing Area Junior Senior High School has earned the College Board's AP® Computer Science Female Diversity Award for expanding young women's access to both AP Computer Science A and AP Computer Science Principles. This award acknowledges 1,105 schools for their work toward equal gender representation during the 2021-22 school year. Wyomissing Area Jr./Sr. High School is one of only 64 schools to be recognized for achieving this important result in both courses. Research shows that female students who take AP computer science are more likely to major in computer science in college compared with matched peers. Through our leadership in diversifying computer science education, we are preparing our female students for the high-paying, in-demand jobs of the future and giving them the opportunity to help solve some of society's most challenging problems. WREC Utilizes WIN Period for Valuable Learning Experiences



Our sixth-grade Spartans participate in a daily WIN period each morning for thirty minutes. This time, targeted towards "what I need" (WIN) provides opportunities for students and teachers to explore a variety of learning activities. In January, students had the opportunity to participate in STEM challenges. One group, composed of Violet Peris, Suzy Bressler, Julia Flores, and Hazel Sensenig, completed an amazing project for St. Jude's Children's Hospital. They were tasked with creating something to amuse children who are receiving treatment and are bored but can't leave their hospital room. The students partnered together and created a fake snow machine using torn-up cotton and a fan as well as a tube to project the "snow" into the air. They created a little box with a mini snow shovel, directions for building a snowman (including twigs), and a homemade hat. The project concluded with a presentation to the class. Shout out to our Spartans for brainstorming such a valuable and creative activity, and to our WREC teachers for facilitating this enriching time for our students. We look forward to learning more about the exciting projects students explore during WIN time.

Grade 5 Investigation: What's in the Water?

On January 11, trout eggs arrived at the West Reading Elementary Center for the Trout in the Classroom program with Mrs. Kline and Ms. Kupiszewski. Trout in the Classroom is an environmental education program that is made possible by the PA Council of Trout Unlimited and the PA Fish and Boat Commission. It is designed to teach students about the impact, protection, and enhancement of PA watersheds.

The tank is set up to emulate a natural freshwater stream. It has a chiller, a filter with a strong water flow, and a bubbler to make sure that the water has enough air. Our Spartans created a logo for the program and had weekly "trout shout-outs" to help all students keep track of the tank's progress. They conducted water testing a few times a week to check levels of ammonia, nitrates, nitrites, and pH. The pH level tested very high when the water was in the tank, which was the only problem with the water that they could detect.



The trout hatched about a week after they arrived, around January 17. Like other embryos in eggs, the trout had a yolk sac on their bellies to provide them with nourishment. As they grew, the yolk sac got smaller and smaller. At that point, it was time to feed the fish that would swim to the top to eat, but unfortunately, many fish died every day during this time. Our students and teachers worked hard to problem-solve what was causing the fish to die. That included water changes, adding pH lowering chemicals, and consulting with the Berks County Conservation District. By the time they had fish big enough to swim in the big tank on February 6, there were only 8 trout remaining. Since the release into the big tank, the numbers have fluctuated. At one time, they thought we had lost them all! Then they noticed two swimmers that must have been hiding in the rocks, but now believe they are down to one lone fish at this time.

Unfortunately, this also happened three years ago when WREC first participated in the Trout in the Classroom program. The students at that time affectionately named the last living fish Rocky Balboa. He was released into Wyomissing Creek in April 2020. This year's group of students decided to name our last trout Rocky II. They will soon be changing the water in the tank with spring water to try to regulate the levels before receiving new trout babies. Some students are working hard to research problems and find solutions. Part of the mystery is to figure out why the pH rises in the tank when it is not high coming from the tap. Wish our Spartans luck and stay tuned for a hopeful spring release date!


WREC Students Create Beautiful Art Display

7th Grade Spartans Participate in Grief and Loss Day



Recently, our 7th grade students read a book and a play in English class in which several characters are faced with grief. After reading, our teachers wanted to allow students the opportunity to explore what grief is, research various kinds/elements of grief, and research strategies that will help others address and cope with these difficult situations. 7th-grade Grief and Loss Day was designed to provide students with hands-on ways to cope with grief and loss. Now, students will be showcasing what they have learned by creating projects for a character

from one of the literature pieces to help that character acknowledge and cope with the loss.

On Grief and Loss Day, five amazing therapy dogs visited our students. Their trainers shared so much information about the dogs and the benefits of therapy dogs in general. At the stress-relief area, students learned that coloring relaxes the amygdala while they colored printed pages or created their journals. At the discovery table, students read a variety of articles or children's books about grief and loss or listened to the audio version. Students also learned about our SAP groups, and explanations of the 5 stages of grief, and worked to connect those stages to characters in the literature. It was a great day!

WAEF funds supported the following projects since the last issue of Scoop:

WAEF's Anne McCullough Endowment Fund supported students who wanted to attend leadership opportunities including Model UN and Harvard and MIT's organization, Take the World Forward.

WAEF's Customer Bank Trade and Technology Fund has supported Wyomissing students who study at BCTC and need help with fees and books.

WAEF's EITC funds supported the purchase of 3D Scanning-Modeling-Printing in the classroom which allows students to create digital file formats of 3D objects. Those models can be stored, manipulated, scaled, and replicated using various mediums of 3D printing and also integrated with virtual/augmented reality applications.
