Science Field Trip to Wilkes University



A group of students in AP Environmental Science and AP Biology attended Wilkes University's Environmental Science Day. They toured the college campus, explored labs in the Cohen Science Center, and enjoyed a complimentary lunch with current students, faculty, and staff. The students also had the opportunity to participate in labs with instruction from the college professors. The first was called "Rivers, Flood, and Landslides-Oh My!" which examined the effects of bodies of water concerning erosion as well as explored how bodies of water change due to the movement of the surrounding land. The lab "Grasping the Gravity of the Situation: Gravity Anomalies and Earth Structures" inspected how gravity affects structures on Earth as well as the effect of distance from Earth on this phenomenon. In the "Preserving Plants for Fun and Science" lab, students discovered the question of how to properly preserve plants to make an herbarium—a systematically arranged collection of dried plants. "Insect Villains and Heroes" took a further look at the effects of invasive species on the invaded areas and the benefits of pollinators and their work in ecosystems. "Oh, Say Can you Seed!" taught the students how to identify various types of vital seeds, and the "Weather patterns and their effects" lab taught the students a more in-depth understanding of convention and conducting currents found in both air and water. Overall, this trip gave students an in-depth look at careers in the environmental science and the geoscience fields as well as allowed them to participate in beneficial labs related

to those fields. This was an enriching experience for our Spartans and provided them the opportunity to engage in important academic discussions with students from many schools!

Spanish Club/Honors Society Volunteer at Helping Harvest



Members of the Spanish Club and the Spanish Honors Society volunteered at Helping Harvest in October. Students spent time collaborating with each other and other regular volunteers at Helping Harvest to help fight hunger in the Berks and Schuylkill County area. Bringing students together and supporting the community were major themes in volunteering at Helping Harvest which supplies to more than 320 charitable food programs. Students helped pack boxes, distribute packaged food, and move resources within the Fresh Food Bank joining together to combat hunger. We love seeing our students give back to the community and appreciate community connections for service opportunities for our students.

AP US History: Historic Philadelphia Walking Tour



On Monday, November 7, AP United States History (APUSH) students participated in a field trip led by Mr. Hetrich in which they toured Old City, Philadelphia. This trip places APUSH students at the historic locations that shaped the founding of the American Republic. Students toured the city making stops at Independence Hall, the First Bank of the United States, and a drive-by visit to Eastern State Penitentiary, among other locations. At each landmark location, students presented historic information on the significance of the location and key historical figures in our nation's independence. They practiced their AP-style writing as well, responding to short answer questions on how the rhetoric of the American Revolution unleashed rights for a variety of Americans that the "founding fathers" may not have envisioned. APUSH students engaged in several other debates during the trip and connected their learning from the classroom to the real world very efficiently. Students valued their time in the Old City, and it is great to see our Spartans have the opportunity to explore history in real-time with this field trip that Mr. Hetrich has led for the last 12 years.

Eighth-Grade Class Trip to Gettysburg



Our eighth-grade Spartans participated in a field trip to Gettysburg. This cross-curricular trip included the history and geology (Earth Science) of Gettysburg and the historical battle of Gettysburg. On the trip, students participated in a guided bus tour of Gettysburg. After the guided tours, students visited the national cemetery in Gettysburg and completed a walking tour with their teacher chaperones stopping and reading about specific monuments in the cemetery. Many students went out of their way to thank Dr. Yoder for organizing this trip; they seemed to appreciate it and were thankful for going. Students enjoyed themselves and got to experience a bit of history and geology at the park in which they could connect their classroom experiences to the real world.

Theatre Arts & Drama Club Visit the Yocum Institute



Students in the Jr./Sr. High School Drama Club and Theatre Arts class at the Jr./Sr. High School attended the performance of "Poe's Unhappy Hour"—a play based on the works of Edgar Allen Poe—at the Yocum Institute. In Theatre Arts, students are currently learning and practicing how to implement improvisation into performances. The production included improvisation and the students connected the uses of it within the playback to their learnings. Students also took note of the character development on display by the professional actors and tied it to their recent discussions on the considerable importance of character development in a successful production. Not only were the students able to see such a great performance live, but some Spartans were called out of the audience to take part in the show! When the play finished, there was an opportunity for the students to ask both the cast and the director questions. We are so glad that we can provide our students with these incredible opportunities that connect their learnings in school to real-life events and allow the students to explore their interests and passions.

Girls in STEM Symposium



A group of students at the Jr./Sr. High School in grades 10-12 interested in the STEM fields attended the annual Girls in STEM Symposium at Kutztown University with computer science teacher, Mr. Minich. The eight students spent the day listening to a panel of speakers of women in the STEM field, learning about career opportunities, and meeting other students from other Berks County schools with a similar passion. Fundamentals of networking, asking questions, and exploring opportunities, whether in the biomedical field or computer science college majors were explored throughout the day. Engineers from Penske, Medical IT workers from St. Luke, and web designers were set up on tables along the outline of the room ready to answer questions and converse with all of the Berks County students, helping to expose the multitude of opportunities available to students even while still in high school. Students were able to get access to contact information and company names that offer internships, shadowing experiences, and summer volunteer opportunities to learn about STEM career pathways.



Career Day, which took place on November 9, 2022, is an annual event for students in grades 8-12 to explore possible careers and post-secondary pathways as they begin to think about their futures after high school. Planned and executed by a committee of dedicated parents and community volunteers, with support from teachers, the counseling office, and other school staff, Career Day focuses on age-appropriate activities that encourage students to expand on their career exploration year after year. Each grade participates in different activities throughout the day with guidance from speakers and panel presenters from a variety of careers. For example, after attending panel presentations on careers that interest them in the morning, ninth-grade students toured local industries (in partnership with BBEC) to learn about various businesses. These students will also visit BCTC and a local college/university this year for full access to the many high schools and post-secondary pathways available to them. Students in grades 10 and 11 engaged in a panel presentation with local human resources representatives who spoke about employment during high school and the qualities managers look for during the hiring process. Eleventh-grade students also participated in round table discussions where representatives from various colleges/universities discussed education requirements and the careers possible with certain degrees. Our seniors learned how to give bystander CPR, participated in a service project, and walked through a financial reality fair exploring salaries and loan scenarios based on possible education and career pathways. This day would not be as successful as it's been for the last many years without the support and participation of many presenters who are willing to share their knowledge with our Spartans. We thank them dearly and are grateful to provide students with the opportunity to explore various careers and interests for the future.

WHEC Welcomes Baby Chicks!



In fourth grade, classes get to spend twelve weeks with baby chicks! Throughout this time, students learn so much about the characteristics of chicks. They rotate the eggs, watch them hatch, hold the baby chicks (the best part!), and feed them. Students participate in the entire process as it takes up to 24 days for their chicks to hatch. Some facts the fourth-grade students shared with communications intern Kaitlyn were:

- "the temperature must be kept at 100 degrees"
- "the chicks and their habitat must get water everyday"
- "before the eggs hatched, they needed to be turned which was their exercise, and they needed to have unpolluted air."

Through this experience, our students are learning about the chicks' life cycle and what is needed to care for them. Our Spartans are thriving with their chicks and we are so proud!


Writing with Mrs. Kozuch



At the West Reading Elementary School, Mrs. Kozuch's writing students dove into an independent choice unit. For over a month, students researched any topic that sparked their interest and wrote papers that reflected their passion. They then shared their writings with a stakeholder connected to their topic. In doing this, the students had the opportunity to explore great connections through their writing and learn that writing is more than just an assignment waiting for a grade. Several students have already heard back from the stakeholders they contacted. Spartan Junia Hershey connected with Berks Nature, writing about climate change and ways to engage more kids her age in the conversation. Berks Nature invited Junia to attend their "State of the Environment" breakfast at the DoubleTree, where they shared her writing and offered her an internship for the future! Liam Jones-Zezenski wrote about Norwegian history and about how it has shaped Norwegian policies today. He was fascinated by the limitless amount of knowledge and information available on his topic. He connected with the Norwegian-American

Chamber of Commerce, and they shared his research with their in-house author, Jorgen Flood, who sent Liam two signed copies of his books on Norwegian history. Norah Tice researched orcas in captivity and the effects on their behavior and health. She sent her findings to PETA in hopes of them publishing her article on their website. The organization responded to Norah, encouraging her to explore newsfeeds and youth councils. These are only some of the many students that sent their writings out to organizations and stakeholders in hopes of making a difference. We are so proud of their hard work in expanding their horizons to speak up about issues important to them and share their learning with the greater community!

Poster Contest at WHEC





This November, students at the Wyomissing Hills Elementary School participated in the first-ever school-wide "Attendance Matters Poster Contest" which honored winners from each grade. The attendance committee is the elementary school's subcommittee of the district-wide Student Assistance Program (SAP). Their goal is centered around enhancing the student's educational experiences and activities such as this contest encourage young learners to reflect on their time spent at school. Upon being introduced to this contest by Mrs. Albright, students created posters and drawings to answer questions such as "What is your favorite part of the school day?" and "How can you make each school day your best day?" These questions, geared towards specific grades, were equally given to all students along with materials such as paper and supplies.
